Simplified East Texas Communities Charitable Giving

\$2.86 Million Raised for Area Nonprofits through East Texas Giving Day; 5,920 Pledged Volunteer Hours

Nonprofits in East Texas benefited from the generosity of 5,860 donors during East Texas Giving Day, the region's recognized day of giving to support local nonprofits.

The online fundraising effort began at 6:00 a.m. on Tuesday, April 25th, and ended at midnight. Donors contributed \$2,860,853 to support causes they care about in 32 East Texas counties.

"East Texas residents stepped up in a big way," said Kyle Penney, President of East Texas Communities Foundation, which hosts the online event. "Nonprofit organizations spent countless hours getting the word out about the needs facing our region. Donors across East Texas responded generously to meet the call. It's a community effort we can all be proud of."

During East Texas Giving Day, nonprofit organizations encouraged their donors and the public to make charitable donations online at www.EastTexasGiving-Day.org. Donors could choose among 350 participating charities, and make

donations starting at just \$10. Throughout the day, donations to select nonprofits were eligible to be matched thanks to the generosity of individuals and nonprofit business partners that had already pledged funds to the charities they support. This year, \$1.4 million in match was available on the East Texas Giving Day website.

East Texas Giving Day benefited non-profits of all sizes. Topping the leader-boards was Northeast Texas Community College Foundation in Titus County raising \$244,680. Two Smith County charities followed; Bethesda Health Clinic receiving \$159,345, followed by Breckenridge Village of Tyler raising \$155,814.

Northeast Texas Community College Foundation also received the most overall donations. Their 207 separate donations helped the nonprofit exceed their \$7,500 match

Impacting Community with Corporate Giving

Employers across East Texas are supportive of nonprofits, but one local company decided giving back would be a great way to engage their employees and create a culture of philanthropy.

Jasper, a family-owned business headquartered in Whitehouse, Texas, that provides gas processing solutions, wanted to involve employees directly in the company's charitable work. In June 2018, the executive team established the Jasper Employee Charitable Giving Fund at East Texas Communities Foundation.

The Jasper Employee Directed Giving Fund fulfills two purposes. One is to provide donations to worthy nonprofits in East Texas and the second is to provide employees a voice in the process of intentional corporate generosity.



Jasper employees are challenged to give back to their community through volunteering and online contributions. The company set a goal on East Texas Giving Day, for 50 employees to participate in the online fundraising event. The Employee Directed Giving Fund is made up of a committee of five employees selected. To be considered for the committee, an employee must be employed by one of the Jasper family of companies for two years as well as volunteer within the community. Once a quarter, the employee committee reviews, discusses and votes on electronically submitted nonprofit grant applications.

"The goal of the fund is to support causes we as employees are passionate about that align with the company's mission and values," said Melissa Winebarger, Beyond Business Manager at Jasper. "The fund has been an exciting way for employees to learn about the needs of the community and the organizations in our community doing the work."

The company encourages their employees to personally give back using their time, talent and treasure. To strengthen this philosophy, each employee is provided eight paid service hours to volunteer.

During East Texas Giving Day, the Beyond Business team challenged employees to commit to give personally, setting a goal of 50 employees participating in the online event.

"Our employees amaze us with their generosity and love for community," said Winebarger. "During East Texas Giving Day our employees gave over \$49,000 to support participating nonprofits. Not only does this make our community stronger, it makes our company stronger"

ETCF Awards over \$810,000 in Scholarships

East Texas Communities Foundation awarded \$810,550 in scholarships to high school and college students across East Texas for the 2023-24 school year. Scholarship amounts range from \$500-\$30,000 per student, originating from 88 different scholarship funds at ETCF.

"East Texas Communities Foundation is honored to help these deserving students continue their education. It is our privilege to fulfill the charitable goals of the many individuals, organizations, and families who have made it possible," said Kyle Penney, President of East Texas Communities Foundation. "Each year we are impressed with the quality of students applying for these funds. The donors who have invested in these students through the creation of scholarship funds have given a lasting gift to all East Texans."

ETCF recognized 124 new recipients of scholarships and 116 renewing scholarship recipients. Over 4,000 applicants applied for available scholarships this year.

The mission of CampV is to integrate military and civilian resources through one central location providing efficient and effective support and fellowship for Veterans, active duty, reserves, guards and their families.



Health: Christus Trinity Mother Frances Health System Ross Breast Center received funding to assist with the purchase of a new, state-of-the-art mobile mammography unit. The mobile unit provides mammograms in rural East Texas, giving providers the ability to detect more invasive breast cancers.

Youth Development: Mentoring Alliance received funding to assist with hosting Rose City Summer Camps. Each week, campers grow in their faith, while building relationships and engaging in academic sessions.
